# **KEY CLUB AND KIWANIS CLUB**



Members of local Kiwanis clubs serve as our advisors, attend our meetings, and volunteer many hours with special meetings like our rallies, district and international conventions, and officer training.

Recently, Franklin County High School Kiwanis advisor and liaison Eugene Harrell was featured in a story in Frankfort's newspaper, *The State Journal*. The article is below:

# Harrel finds reason for optimism in youth

Gene Harrell minces no words when he talks about the importance of volunteer work and what volunteering has meant in his life.

"Volunteering helps address needs in the community," said Harrell, 71. "There's a satisfaction that comes with volunteering and, I think, if people don't find ways to volunteer they are missing one of the major components of life."

Harrell, a member of the East Frankfort Kiwanis Club for 35 years, is the liaison to the Key Club at Franklin County High School, which the



East Frankfort club sponsors. Other activities include the backpack program in local schools, a fish fry for senior citizens, and now in its 57th year, the East Frankfort Kiwanis baseball tournament.

During his years working with the Key Club, he's seen a lot of young people grow into leadership positions and become responsible adults.

"I'm an only child and I never married," he said, having come to Frankfort 40 years ago from Mayfield in western Kentucky to work in the office of the state treasurer. "These young people have become my children, and I'm blessed to have had the opportunity to work with them and have them still accept me."

Harrell says that, at a time when the country seems to be losing "empathy and the volunteer spirit," young people give him some reassurance for the future.

"Because of them, I'm pretty optimistic," he said. Harrell credits the late Keith Ashby for getting him involved in Kiwanis—and ultimately volunteerism.

"Keith kept coming into my office and trying to get me into Kiwanis," he said. "Finally, I ran out of excuses, he continued his persistence and I joined. He was in declining health and wanted me to work with the Key Club."

"That was the best thing that ever happened. Joining Kiwanis totally changed my life—and it was because of Keith's persistence."

Harrell said his takeaway from that experience was "never take no for an answer. If it's important, keep asking," he said.

At a time when membership in adult service organizations is declining, he said, Key Club remains strong. It's the largest service opportunity for high school students. There are 5,000 clubs in 38 countries—150 of them in the Kentucky-Tennessee District.

Harrell is proud that the Franklin County High School Key Club has produced two international presidents in John Jordan, who served from 1985-1986, and Jason Howard, who served two terms in the top office from 1991-1993. "The FCHS Key Club is the only one to ever have had two international presidents," he said. "All I can say to anyone is that service can be fun, whether it's kids or adults. It develops camaraderie that's so important in life." Both Jordan and Howard continued their education at Wake Forest University.




